## Letter from Leadership

Dear Community Members,

In 2025, we embraced The Dignity of Hope as a guiding theme, affirming that even in the most uncertain times, every individual deserves stability and the opportunity to build a future with support, dignity, and hope. For our staff and community members, these values are not abstract—they translate into actions that guide daily decisions and resilience.

Hope and dignity come alive when people build supportive relationships and face challenges together. That spirit was evident in 1980, when advocates launched the Milwaukee Women's Center at a time when supporting survivors of domestic violence was rare and controversial. Today, 45 years later, the Milwaukee Women's Center—a division of Community Advocates—is a trusted resource, helping thousands of survivors each year take brave steps toward safer, more stable futures.

This same commitment shaped the Milwaukee Rental Housing Resource Center (RHRC), which marked its fifth year of service in 2025. A long-envisioned collaboration, the RHRC became a reality during the global pandemic and now serves more than 10,000 tenants and property owners annually with assessment, rental assistance, mediation, legal support, and education to prevent evictions and promote housing stability. We are proud to host the RHRC in our downtown offices, open Monday through Friday on a walk-in basis.

In 2026, Community Advocates will celebrate our 50th anniversary—a milestone rooted in founder Ramon Wagner's vision of hope and dignity for all. For five decades, our dedicated team and volunteers have been the foundation of this work, ensuring that those facing homelessness, domestic violence, and other crises receive compassionate, life-changing support and comprehensive services.

We are deeply grateful to our partners and community members whose belief in our mission amplifies our impact. As you will see in this report, together we have shown that meaningful change is possible—and that hope thrives when everyone has the opportunity to live with dignity.





# Milwaukee Women's Center Emergency Shelter: Where Safety Begins—and Cycles of Violence End

For survivors of domestic violence and families facing homelessness, the Milwaukee Women's Center (MWC) is often the first place where fear gives way to safety—and crisis gives way to possibility. It is where dignity is restored, strength is reclaimed, and hope begins to take root.

Founded in 1980, MWC emerged when few services existed for survivors and even fewer addressed the long-term cycle of abuse. Milwaukee advocates stepped forward to create emergency shelter and support grounded in listening, trust, and survivor leadership. That commitment changed lives then—and continues to do so today.

Now operating as a division of Community Advocates, MWC remains a critical lifeline in moments of crisis. Each year, MWC supports **more than 2,000 women, men, and children**, helping them move from immediate danger toward safety, stability, and independence. As one of only **two emergency domestic violence shelters in Milwaukee County—and the only shelter serving both domestic violence survivors and families experiencing homelessness—MWC anchors the community's safety net**, providing **75 beds every night**, three nourishing meals a day, and individualized case planning that helps families rebuild their lives.



## Nevermore: Accountability Creates Safer Futures



Ending domestic violence demands more than emergency response, it requires accountability and lasting change. Survivors may return to abusive partners, people with a history of abuse may form new relationships, and children are often affected. Without intervention, cycles of harm persist.

The **Nevermore Batterer's Intervention Program** at the Milwaukee Women's Center, founded in 1982, meets this challenge by working directly with men who have caused

harm. Over **23 weeks**, participants reflect on their actions, recognize abusive patterns, and learn nonviolent, respectful alternatives. The program's measurable goal: **reduce future harm, boost survivor safety, and strengthen families.**

Martin's experience in 2025 reflects what is possible. Court-ordered to attend, he initially disengaged, leaving the program twice before returning voluntarily, motivated to change. **"You all always walked with me,"** Martin shared with facilitators. **"I came back because I knew you could help me become a better man for myself, my children, and my fiancée."**

Martin completed the full program in 2025, took accountability for his actions, and gained tools to build healthy relationships—demonstrating how focused intervention can interrupt cycles of violence and create lasting change.



## Milwaukee Women's Center Celebrates 45 Years of Service

On July 10, 2025, Community Advocates celebrated the Milwaukee Women's Center's 45th anniversary, highlighting how the community supports families through tough times. Emcee Alexandria Mack led guests through moving reflections, including a spoken word performance by Miss Dia and uplifting remarks from CEO Andi Elliott, Board President Sharon Jordan, and former Board President Bryan House.



The MWC celebrated past and present survivors, leaders, and advocates who honor the hope and dignity of people impacted by domestic violence and homelessness.

A video from former shelter guest Liceal shared how the center helped her and her son find peace and resilience after a painful period in their lives. With staff support, she felt safe to be vulnerable and began working toward her goals. "I gained strength I didn't know I had," she said.

Recognition came from Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley and Karin Tyler of the City of Milwaukee's Office of Community Wellness and Safety, who both presented official proclamations to our leaders.

Generous guests raised over \$50,000 during the Raise Hope and Fund-A-Need appeal, ensuring the essential work continues. Special thanks to our incredible sponsors who made the event possible, our event co-chairs Kate Venne and Sandy Samse, and to Direct Supply for hosting us at their Innovation & Technology Center.

# Dignity and Hope: Ensuring Housing Stability Through a Continuum of Housing Services



Housing stability is central to Community Advocates' mission. What distinguishes our work is a continuum of housing services that meets people wherever they are, whether they are in immediate crisis, facing instability, or striving for long-term security and independence.

When individuals face street homelessness, need emergency shelter, or must escape unsafe situations due to domestic violence or family crisis, Community Advocates delivers safety and urgent support. As people move from homelessness or shelter toward stability, we remain by their side, offering supportive housing, case management, and wraparound services that foster health, wellness, and independence. For families and individuals threatened by eviction, job loss, or utility shutoffs, we act early to prevent short-term setbacks from becoming lasting crises.

In 2025, Community Advocates provided shelter and supportive housing to **255 adults and children per day**, totaling **93,075 bed-nights** across our programs. Through the Milwaukee Rental Housing Resource Center, **3,500 Milwaukee households** facing financial hardship or eviction risk received assessment for short-term rental assistance and **comprehensive tenant and landlord supports**, preventing housing loss and encouraging stability. Additionally, **27,145 Milwaukee County residents** were assisted through the **Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)** at Community Advocates, helping to reduce utility-related instability and ensure safe, heated homes during the coldest months.

These numbers represent far more than services. They are adults regaining stability and hope, children remaining in school, families staying together, and neighborhoods strengthened by housing security. Above all, they reveal a community that honors dignity and believes everyone deserves a safe place to call home.

## Jonathan's Story: A Life with Dignity

Jonathan deserved better. At 64, Jonathan faced homelessness in a downtown Milwaukee bus shelter, struggling with serious mental illness and complex medical challenges. He deserved safety, dignity, and hope.

In 2025, Jonathan was referred to Community Advocates' **Autumn West Safe Haven**, where individuals with disabling conditions receive furnished guest suites, case management, and wraparound support in a caring environment.

Arriving bedridden and mistrustful, Jonathan slowly regained trust thanks to the patience and consistency of the Autumn West staff. With coordinated services, he secured Social Security benefits, reconnected with his family, and found permanent supportive housing.

Today, Jonathan has a stable home and foundation for recovery, his dignity restored, his hope renewed.



# The Transformative Power of Art: Uniting Creativity and Community Action at Feed Your Soul

Community Advocates was honored to be the featured nonprofit at the 22nd Annual Feed Your Soul event at the House of Rad on November 7, 2025. This celebrated arts-centered philanthropic gathering brought together generous artists, performers, musicians, and community members from Milwaukee.

Feed Your Soul powerfully showcased how art can unite creativity and community action for a cause, addressing the needs of individuals and families rebuilding their lives after homelessness or domestic violence. With the support of 80 local artists, over 500 attendees, and dedicated sponsors, the event generated \$120,000—enough to provide about 2,500 safe nights of emergency shelter, meals, and wraparound services at the Milwaukee Women’s Center and Autumn West Safe Haven.

Andi Elliott, Community Advocates CEO, expressed her gratitude for the outpouring of support for our community members. “This is urgent, life-changing impact,” she said.



## Public Policy Institute Advances Well-Being Through Upstream Solutions

Our Public Policy Institute (PPI) brings together community stakeholders to improve health, wellness, and self-sufficiency by addressing “upstream” factors that cause poor health and instability. Through PPI’s Child Welfare, Community Engagement, and Training/TA teams, staff provides strategic, strengths-based, and effective strategies that produce long-term results.

## The Milwaukee Rental Housing Center Turns Five

In 2025, the Milwaukee Rental Housing Resource Center (RHRC) marked five years of service by convening partners and stakeholders to reflect on changes in Milwaukee’s rental housing landscape since 2020. Launched virtually during the pandemic, RHRC has grown into a permanent, walk-in resource at Community Advocates’ downtown offices, serving tenants and property owners.

RHRC’s mission is to prevent evictions and promote stability, made possible through strong partnerships with the City of Milwaukee Department of Neighborhood Services, Legal Aid Society of Milwaukee, Legal Action of Wisconsin, Mediate Wisconsin, Milwaukee County Housing Division, the Rental Property Association of Wisconsin, and the Urban Economic Development Association of Wisconsin—working together to strengthen Milwaukee’s rental housing system and create a safer, more stable Milwaukee.

## Alexia's Story: Building a Brighter Future

Alexia, mom of two sweet kids, was having trouble keeping everything together. During an especially difficult time, Alexia was referred to Community Advocates' Stronger Families Milwaukee program, which provides case management and wraparound assistance for parents who want help stabilizing their household. A Family Engagement Specialist worked with Alexia so she could identify her goals and how to reach them. Topping the list was finding a better place to live. "Going through what I went through... I was happy to get out of it." Even though it was tough at times and she got discouraged, Alexia found a new place, one that provided a stable foundation for her family. "I found something way better," she said.


## Taylor's Story: A Journey to Safe Housing

Taylor and her family were struggling to cope after their apartment building had structural failure and no water supply, leading the City of Milwaukee to declare it to be unfit for human habitation. Community Advocates' Housing Assistance Program team stepped in with resources. With the team's guidance, Taylor's family was able to get a new place to live, which was safe and secure. Community Advocates also covered her first month's rent and a part of her security deposit to cover her move-in cost. Now, the family happily lives in a unit that is safe, suitable, and affordable.
